#### From Pastor Caroline

Growing up in Iowa, the saying "knee high by the Fourth of July" referred to the growth of the field corn, one of our staple crops. There are always benchmarks and measurements that help us to know that we're growing, maturing, and moving forward. This is true in life; it is also true in faith. Faith is a living, dynamic, experience. No wonder I like the Wesleyan Quadrilateral: scripture, reason, tradition and experience, all coming together to form and shape us, our understanding of God, and our life in community.

In the liturgical season of "Ordinary Time," the "season after Pentecost", there is nothing really "novel or marvelous, just the regular rhythms of life", as Diana Butler Bass writes. Yet is in the living of these days, doing ordinary things, that we discover the power and mystery of the Divine. We may not be able to see it as it happens; we can see so much more clearly when we look back. But God is there; God is here; God is always at work in our lives and in our world. As Diana Butler Bass writes, "For all the hoopla of Christmas, Easter, and Pentecost, the truth of the matter is that God is the God of Ordinary Time. All the ordinary, regular, forgettable years. It has all been a journey. Sometimes we just haven't noticed."

In this "Ordinary Time" the work of the St. John's Future Together Task Force continues. At our spring congregational meeting on June 11, we shared the initial **draft** of the Strategic Planning Document for 2023-2026, which highlighted the five themes (spiritual deepening, energizing participation, community engagement, congregational care, and financial sustainability), seventeen goals, and the commitments for each. The task force has been hard at work developing some initial **action plans** that will help us to put "flesh on the bones" and see how we might begin to live into these goals and dreams. Copies of the slides providing examples of action plans shared at the Congregational Meeting are available in the Narthex and at the Welcome Center.

The challenge of implementation is a critical piece of all visioning work. We can craft grand plans and develop great goals; yet if we do not put them into practice, we have not done our job. I am incredibly pleased with the work we have done to this point and we need **you** to be a part of this important work. Your ideas, energy, and support are greatly appreciated.

I will be attending the United Church of Christ's General Synod in Indianapolis, IN, June 30 to July 4, and I look forward to spending time with friends and colleagues from across our denomination. I will be traveling further west after Synod to spend time with my dad and brother David. Dad asked him recently when we'll be "nose to nose" and I was happy to say "soon, Dad. July 6." I will return to lead the worship service on Sunday, July 16.

I must also express deep appreciation for your care and concern following my recent fall and subsequent non-displaced fracture of my nose. I'm steadily healing and giving thanks for good friends, medical and dental care, and the resilience of (relative) youth.

Every two years, General Synod brings together thousands of faithful members of the United Church of Christ for inspirational worship, conducting the business of the church, formal church witness, and fellowship with friends.

The 34th General Synod will be held in Indianapolis, IN, June 30 to July 4, 2023.

The theme for the 34th General Synod is based on Isaiah 43:18-19, "Do not remember the former things or consider the things of old. I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert."

With dynamic workshops, generative plenary sessions, inspirational worship, engaging youth activities, it is sure to be a powerfully spiritually renewing time for delegates and visitors alike. Delegates (including our own Pastor Caroline and Jerry Thomason) will conduct the business of the denomination and set priorities for our ministries. The Keynote speaker (Rev. Nadia Bolz-Weber) will offer illumination and insight into the challenges that face our congregations and communities. And delegates and visitors alike will stand up for issues that demand a faithful witness and worship together.

We hope that the 34th General Synod will indeed be a vibrant, spirit-filled and inspiring event in the life of the United Church of Christ.

In addition to serving as a delegate from the Penn Central Conference, Pastor Caroline will be attending General Synod as part of the Next Generation Leadership Initiative (NGLI). A program of the Pension Boards of the United Church of Christ, NGLI has been instrumental in Pastor Caroline's growth as a local church pastor.







### THE ORIGIN OF CHURCH CHOIRS

Have you ever thought about where the first church choir was formed? Well, there is some information available that helps with this question. The following are some examples. In the Hebrew Scriptures, we read that the first choir was formed by Moses and the children of Israel. The we read about a choir begun by Miriam and her maidens and following this there was a woman's group who came out of a city in Israel to meet Saul and the fourth was a men's group who eventually used boys to sing the high parts and this was the beginning of Boys choirs which we still have today. Also we read about a choir in the second temple made up of twelve adult men who were Levites. These men all played string or percussion instruments and played while they sang.

Coming back to today, we find that many choirs are disappearing and church music is leading more towards contemporary music. In todays culture, Mary Preus, a choir director at a Lutheran church in Minneapolis says, "We don't sing anywhere else in our lives as we once did." She says "I grew up in a singing home, singing in school and church every week and now people think they are not good enough to sing."

"Don't count choirs out", said Eileen Guenther, Professor of church music at Wesley Theological Seminary in Washington. "Churches are struggling to find a style that is engaging. But there is a reason choral music is called "traditional". It's been around for a long time and contemporary music may not have as much staying power." Time will tell!

### Food Preservation with the Gleaning Project!

The Gleaning Project and St. John's UCC have partnered together to help food insecure families in our community. Once a month, volunteers from the Gleaning Project and the wider community utilize our St. John's kitchen to preserve fresh produce, either by freezing or canning, helping to fill the food gap and reduce food waste.

St. John's has committed to providing space for this project thru November 2023 as a pilot program. We are excited about this venture and the opportunities we have to reach out in love to our neighbors.

## HELP SAVE THE HARVEST

1 in 5 kids in South Central PA is "food insecure" and miss out on dependable fresh fruits and vegetables

20-30% of food loss occurs during agricultural production, harvesting, and distribution. All of that waste is perfectly delicious, nutritious, local food that doesn't make it to market for a variety of reasons which are usually cosmetic (size, color, shape etc.)

In 2022, The Gleaning Project saved and supplied **750,000+ lbs** of fresh produce to community partners in Franklin and Adams Counties

#### In 2023 we're hoping to save even more. Here's how:



### Freezing

Labeled fresh fruits and produce can be used anywhere from months to a year after harvest depending on storage! This produce, picked at peak ripeness, contains important nutrients essential for a healthy lifestyle that will be preserved by freezing instead of going to waste!



### Canning

Canning produce can extend it's life from 12-18months! Both water bath and pressure canning can be used to salvage produce from fields and extend harvest year round to those who are food insecure and without freezers!



### Saving the Veggies

With the help of the community, The Gleaning Project hopes to save more produce than ever and continue to fill the food gap that occurs during months where harvest has stopped but hunger persists.
