

#### From Pastor Caroline

I do most of my grocery shopping at Aldi (they have the best fresh produce prices around). It's always fun to wander the aisles, seeing the specialty and seasonal items they carry. For instance, they have an extensive variety of Advent calendars: coffee, chocolate, cheese, even hot sauce. The ones for kids include Lego, Mini Brands, Pokémon, and Paw Patrol. They even have a version for dogs (unfortunately, they do not have a comparable one for cats).

I loved Advent calendars as a child, the anticipation of finding and opening each day's little window, savoring the small piece of chocolate inside. There was always the temptation to rush, to hurry through and "collect all the prizes." Yet there was something sacred about the waiting, not rushing ahead but savoring each day of the Advent season.

We celebrate the season of Advent to help us get ready to welcome Christ into our lives and into our hearts, to make room for the new thing that God is doing. We take time to prepare. With hope, peace, love, and joy, we find our way forward, knowing that God is with us.

December is often a busy month, filled with holiday parties, family gatherings, buying and wrapping presents, decorating trees, baking cookies, and more. Please note: we will have worship at 10 am on Christmas Eve, marking the Fourth Sunday of Advent. There will be two Christmas Eve services: one at 5 pm in Fellowship Hall and one at 7 pm in the Sanctuary (musical prelude will begin at 6:45 pm). These candlelight services are an opportunity to witness to the light of Christ and to take that light back out into the world.

I know that this holiday season can be hard, as well as holy. A community "Blue Christmas" service will be held on Thursday, December 21, 7pm at Calvary United Methodist Church. I'm grateful for the ecumenical efforts in our area that make services like this one possible.

I'm living through a season of "firsts" myself: first birthday, first Thanksgiving, and now first Christmas without my dad. Some days are better than others. Many days are still hard. I give thanks for his life and his presence in mine. I'm doing my best to honor his legacy and the lessons he taught me. As our choir anthem from November 19 (Mark Miller's "I Choose Love") reminded me, "in the midst of pain, I choose love." Each and every day, I choose love.

With hope and peace, love and joy, may we say "yes" to the opportunities and possibilities for spiritual deepening, energizing participation, community engagement, congregational care, and financial sustainability as we grow in love of God and neighbor.

Let us wait. Let us watch. Let us ready ourselves to rejoice, for we hold one another in love and we hold one another in prayer. Blessed Advent and Merry Christmas!




The church office will be closed Monday, December 25 and Tuesday, December 26 for the Christmas Holiday.

#### In The News:

This year marks the 250th anniversary of the first use of the hymn "Faith's Review and Expectation," better known today by the name, "Amazing Grace." Millions of people around the world know the song, written by atheistic-ex-human trafficker-turned Christian cleric and abolitionist John Newton (1725-1807)

Newton, son of a sea captain who was away from home for extended periods of time and a devout woman who died just before Newton turned 7. The boy embarked on his first voyage with his father at the age of 10. His childhood trauma no doubt contributed to his immorality and self-indulgence during his youth, when he was given to drinking, gambling, profanity and mockery of those who held Christian beliefs.

Later he was put on a slave ship headed to West Africa, where he was handed over to Amos Clow, a slave trader, in 1745. Clow enslaved him and gave him to his African wife, Princess Pey Ey, who would abuse and starve him, and withheld medical care from him after he contracted malaria. Clow also put him in irons at times. In 1748, Newton was rescued by a sea captain Newton's father had asked to search for him.

Like millions of people at the time, many saw no contradiction in their faith and their behavior towards Africans. Newton didn't immediately see any conflict between his new beliefs and his employment as a captain of slave ships. As his faith matured, Newton repented of his involvement in the slave trade. He wrote, "I think I should have quit sooner had I considered it as I now do to be unlawful and wrong." Eventually Newton became a minister in the Church of England.

For 22 years, Newton mentored William Wilberforce, who led the campaign in Parliament to abolish the African slave trade. Newton sent copies of his pamphlet, "Thoughts Upon the African Slave Trade," describing the horrific conditions of the slave ships, to every member of the legislature. He wrote: "I hope it will always be a subject of humiliation reflection to me... that I was once an active instrument in a business at which my heart now shudders."

Just before Newton's death in 1807, the Slave Trade Act was enactive, ending the English government's participation in the salve trade.

Newton's epitaph inscribed on his tombstone:

John Newton, Clerk
Once an infidel and libertine,
A servant of slaves in Africa,
Was, by the mercy of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ
Preserved, restored, pardoned,
And appointed to preach the Faith
He had long labored to destroy.

**Update on our Prayer Shawl Ministry** 

A group of knitters and crocheters have been making prayer shawls for the church to give as gifts of comfort or celebration for about fifteen (15) years. Nearly 300 have been given to members and friends of the congregation. The shawls have been created at no cost to the church—time and materials are

donated by the creator. We are thankful to this group for their time and devotion to this

ministry.

Shawls that have been blessed are available for any member to pick up and give to an individual, along with a prayer card. We do keep a record of prayer shawl recipients therefore the office should be notified when one has been given.


We hope those individuals who have been providing shawls will continue to do so, and that other people will also volunteer to knit or crochet shawls.

About the prayer shawl dimensions and colors: Colors are up to the donor. Shawls have been made in a wide variety of colors and patterns and each one is beautiful. In order that the

shawl will be used by the recipient comfortably, shawls should be 18 to 22 inches wide and at least 54 inches long. A sample with suggested pattern can be found in the prayer shawl drawer outside of the office.
