From Pastor Caroline

Merry Christmas and Happy New Year! I hope you've had a wonderful holiday, welcoming Jesus into our hearts, lives and world. Do you set intentions or set resolutions each year?

I personally prefer intentions as opposed to resolutions. Either way, grace is a necessary part of how we live each and every day. Over the last several years, I have chosen a "word of the year" to help guide my heart, mind, and actions. These words have included pivot (2020), patience (2021), and passion (2023). I've been thinking of other appropriate words that begin with "p" (in case you couldn't tell, I like a good theme) and have been prayerfully considering what word might be most appropriate for 2024. Finally, my word came: pilot.

What does it mean to pilot something? As an adjective, this means to experiment with or test something to see how it works. The concept of "piloting" works really well with our strategic plan, as we put ideas into practice and see if we're on the right track.

The other beauty of experimenting or testing something (piloting) is that we're not tied to that idea long-term. It is an opportunity to try something for a season and see how it goes. Sometimes, those are the ideas that we say "well, at least we tried" and other times, those are the ideas that transform our ministry and our lives.

I'm excited about opportunities to practice piloting ideas, ones that we've already identified and those yet to be considered. Piloting allows for flexibility and adaptability, two things I know we learned during the pandemic are critical for being "the church of the future."

Throughout this issue of the Spirit, you'll see new features—things we are trying to share information, connect with one another, and show progress in implementing our Future Together Strategic Plan. These include a "member spotlight" page to help us get to know one another; articles on various financial topics (this month focuses on "what is financial sustainability"); and a "here's where we are" page tracking actions from our strategic plan.

Copies of our Future Together Strategic Plan are available in the Narthex, at the Welcome Center, and by request from the church office. Please pick one up and review the goals in spiritual deepening, energizing participation, community engagement, congregational care, and financial sustainability.

We know from experience (and scripture) that we cannot over-communicate. We want **you** to know what is happening at St. John's UCC, to be excited about the possibilities, and to find ways to get involved. Ephesians 4:12 reminds us to "equip God's people for the work of serving and building up the body of Christ."

May we continue to discern the ways in which God is calling us to love and learn, worship and witness, welcome and serve, especially now as we enter into a new year.

How Handbell Ringing came to the United States

The Peak Family Ringers probably introduced handbell ringing in the United States in the 1830s. They are known to have given concerts in the eastern US and probably predated the Lancashire Ringers whom P. T. Barnum brought from England.

According to an article published in the New York Times on Feb. 22, 1885, Mr. and Mrs. William Peak were at that time in the Cortland County Poorhouse near Homer, N.Y. Mrs. peak stated that she and her husband had heard Barnum's Lancashire Ringers in Eastport, Maine in about 1845. Mrs. Peak also said that the "Swiss People were anxious to return home, because the climate had proved fatal to two of their numbers." Peak bought them out. "After three months' practice," said Mrs. Peak, "William Peak had made himself master of the bell ringing art and had also instructed the other members of our family. On our public appearance, triumph after triumph followed in quick succession."

Phineas T. Barnum was a circus owner, an entrepreneur, and a great showman. While in Liverpool, England, he heard a prize-winning, tune-ringing handbell "band" called the Lancashire Ringers and he arranged to bring them to the United States for a concert tour in the 1840s. Being a showman, he decided to dress them in Swiss Alpine costumes and call them "Swiss Bell Ringers". The Englishmen spoke nothing but English, so it was suggested that they not speak in public. However, Barnum said that if they spoke in their native Lancashire dialect, no one would know that they were speaking English! Because this group of "Swiss" ringers was so successful, Americans often mistakenly think that handbell ringing came to the United States from Switzerland instead of from England.

In 1850, in the tower of Christ Church, Philadelphia, the Lancashire Ringers rang the first complete peal heard in the United States.

Future Together Progress Report

You will note that several of these activities overlap in different areas of our Strategic Plan. We hope this "progress report" helps everyone to see how we are living into our St. John's UCC Future Together Strategic Plan.

SPIRITUAL DEEPENING

- Adding to the weekly Yoga classes, room 202 was used for a craft night project. Spring 2024 events are being planned.
- The Network Ministry's Step Team was active in our worship service as we continue to partner with this group supporting youth in our area.
- A Lenten devotion/reflection booklet is planned for Lent in 2024.
- The prayer chain is advertised weekly and coordinated by the office staff. We continue to pray with and for one another.

ENERGIZE PARTICIPATION

- Lynda Pound is now coordinating the coffee hour hosts.
- A task force has met and is making progress on reviewing the governance and leadership teams needed to succeed in reaching our goals. Our hope is to have a presentation ready for the congregational meeting in June 2024.
- A retreat called Net Engagement facilitated by Jose Ricardo-Osorio is being planned for the Spring. Stay tuned for more details!

CONGREGATIONAL CARE

- Our library (located in room 106) is now hosting a jigsaw puzzle exchange: take one or trade one and enjoy a relaxing time.
- Our youth and several adults went caroling to several of the homebound members of our congregation in December.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

- Our annual Cookie Walk on December 2 was very successful in raising \$600 for homeless youth in the Chambersburg Area School District.
- Bell Fest on December 10 was well attended and an inspiration for everyone.
- Upcoming events in January and early February offer opportunities for community engagement and outreach.
- On January 19, there will be a "Banquet for a New Year" fundraiser hosted by Joshua Gibson who leads the cooking classes at our church.
- On January 28, John Widmann will offer an organ recital in the Sanctuary.
- On February 2, Jose Ricardo-Osorio will be leading a salsa/ merengue class.
- February 13 is our annual Pork & Sauerkraut Dinner before Ash Wednesday on February 14.
- St. John's will host the Salvation Army Auxiliary Fabric Fair in May 2024.

FINANCIAL SUSTAINABILTY

- A newly formed Camp task force has met and is looking at using our camp in more ways in 2024. Camp Ministry is reviewing rental usage and fees.
- St. John's has engaged Berkstresser Realty to assist in marketing our unused or underutilized space for room rentals.
- To assist us in applying for grants, St. John's has engaged Ghost Writer LLC to work on helping us navigate the grant-writing process and secure outside funding for particular projects.
- Online giving and other giving opportunities are regularly advertised.

What is Financial Sustainability?

As a church, we aren't good at talking about money. We never really have been. When we do, the conversations are awkward and the sermons are uncomfortable. It is generally an unpleasant experience. It is also inevitable.

The unfortunate truth is that the church as we know it cannot stand without money. Money pays staff salaries and keeps a roof over our worship space. Money funds our operations and provides a means to live into the mission of our church. Money is the key to financial sustainability, but what is that really?

The simple explanation is that financial sustainability is a long-range plan that allows the church to sustain itself so that it is able to support its purpose. In simpler terms, it means that we have enough money to cover all our expenses, expected or not. Much like a household budget, being financially sustainable means that we planned well for our future needs and wants.

St. John's recently passed a deficit budget for 2024. The good news is we created an ambitious plan to be present in our community while still caring for our congregation, our staff, and our building. The bad news is we will have to dig into our rainy-day funds to do it. Deficit budgets are typically a sign of poor financial health. An unbalanced financial plan cannot be sustained over a long period of time or the savings dry up and we become tasked with finding creative ways to either cut expenses or raise additional income. St. John's is currently working on both.

Our newly adopted Future Together Strategic Plan outlines a series of opportunities for St. John's to support our wider community and promote congregational care. These opportunities, our visions, come with expenses that cannot be supported long-term by an unbalanced budget. It is not financially sustainable. Since mission is tied to the budget, we may be forced to make choices that we don't want to make by abandoning our wants to focus solely on our needs.

The new year is a time for new perspective and quite often, resolution. Motivation for bettering ourselves and our church is fueled by reflections on the past and dreams for our future. St. John's has big dreams. St. John's has a purpose and a mission. It is our responsibility, as a whole church, to support our mission in every way necessary and to sustain that support, financially and otherwise, for a long time going forward.

AN OPPORTUNITY FOR 'COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT'

As part of our "Future Together Strategic Plan" adopted at the congregation meeting in November, you may notice that one of the areas of focus is "Community Engagement." As in several past years, again in January 2024, we have an opportunity to start off our new year by participating in an event offering opportunities for 'volunteering' to assist with the event or directly engaging in the 'learning' and 'service' portions of the day.

On Monday, January 15, 2024, this event for MLK Day includes two components: MLK Day of Learning **and** MLK Day of Service.

1) **MLK Day of Learning**, the theme on the 'learning' component of the day will be "Living the Dream: It Starts with Me." You will gather with participants from throughout Franklin County for this <u>free</u> opportunity to dive into principles and issues surrounding diversity, equity, inclusion, community-building, and social cohesion. The day will feature an Adult Track (grades 9 and above) and a Children/Youth Track (grades K-8th) so people of all ages can turn the MLK Day national holiday into a Day of Learning.

The Adult Track will be held from 11 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. at Central Presbyterian Church. This includes free lunch, general session, a choice of workshops, keynote speaker, entertainment, and more.

The Children/Youth Track will be at Coyle Free Library (where registration begins via adult signature at 10:45 a.m. for drop off), a BYO Lunch at 11 a.m., kid-friendly programming including speakers, sensory activities, scavenger hunts, with this track ending at Central Presbyterian Church at 3:30 p.m.

2) MLK Day of Service – is a rewarding way for families, friends, neighbors and colleagues to make a lasting impact on their community in the spirit of Dr. King's vision of the Beloved Community, Kids under 18 can sign up to volunteer with a parent/guardian/family member.
While this is free, registration is required.

We look forward to St. John's members and friends supporting these very important ways of becoming further engaged in our community and living into our covenant and strategic planning.



2024 WINTER WARMTH DRIVE

A community assessment of Franklin County reveals a high level of poverty and individuals living below the ALICE threshold. The ALICE threshold are individuals and families that earn above the Federal Poverty level, however, do not make enough to afford the basics in the communities where they live. The rates of those at poverty levels and those below the ALICE threshold of Financial Survival for the Chambersburg area and surrounding townships are staggering; and, it is easy as we go about our days, not to be aware of the many needs right before us.

Between January 15 to February 12, we have the opportunity to participate in the Winter Warmth Drive headed up by United Way of Franklin County. Donations and contributions to this drive will help to aid those in poverty, many of whom are housing insecure and/or homeless.

Beginning on January 15 through February 12, you are invited to bring in tangibles and place in the boxes at the church:

- ◆ Food whole grains, seasonings, cooking oils, condiments, flour, sugar, boxed meals, peanut butter, shelf-stable milk, pasta/pasta sauce, and canned goods.
- Personal Care Items first aid kits, hand soap, shampoo, conditioner, body wash, deodorant, tissues, toothpaste, laundry detergent, dish soap, paper towels, mittens, gloves, winter hats, socks

On **Sunday**, **February 4**, **our First Fruits offering** will be an opportunity for you to make monetary donations that will support programs that help provide families with warmth and shelter.

Please join in this effort to continue to create a beloved community wherein we care for one another.





Having celebrated the birth of Jesus to new-mom Mary, we give thanks for the community support that helps new parents care for their young children.

We have the opportunity to offer support to local families in our community by supporting the Diaper Depot. The Diaper Depot is a ministry of Central Presbyterian Church that distributes disposable diapers and wipes to ~180-200 families each month. They have also offered baby items, breakfast, and some food for families.

We know that 1 in 3 families struggle to provide clean diapers for their babies and toddlers. Your contribution of funds for diapers and wipes can go a long way to support this mission. The Diaper Depot is 100% volunteer based; diapers can be purchased by the organization at a wholesale price, so your donations have a large impact. Donations of physical items are also welcome.

families in our community.


