From Pastor Caroline

How did it already get to be February? Weren't we just ringing in the New Year?

Time is among our most precious resources. There are only so many hours in a day, week, and year. We do our best to use our time wisely, doing our best to live out the call to love. Along with Advent, Lent is a season of preparation, a time set aside for contemplation and spiritual renewal, drawing closer to God and allowing God to draw closer to us. The 40 days (plus Sundays) of Lent lead us from Ash Wednesday to Easter Sunday. Following the lunar calendar, Lent and Easter are early this year. Lent begins with worship on Ash Wednesday, February 14, 6:30 pm in the Sanctuary. I hope you will join us to remember that not only are "you dust and to dust you shall return" but "you are loved and to love you shall return."

This year, we're piloting a few opportunities to enhance our Lenten experience. Joining together with other churches in the "Conococheague Mission Cooperative," St. John's will participate in shared Wednesday worship services in Lent (not Ash Wednesday or Holy Week). The theme of these services is "Lenten Lament: a journey toward joy." The schedule for these services is as follows (all services will be at 7 pm):

Wednesday, March 20, St. John's UCC, Pastor Robin Baer preaching

In addition to offering these ecumenical opportunities to join together with faithful people from other churches, Dale Myers has coordinated the publication of a "Lenten Reflections Booklet" that may help you to go deeper this Lent. You may learn something new, find an additional perspective to consider, and/or be moved by the testimony of those who have contributed a reflection from their spiritual journey. This resource is unique to SJUCC.

The Lenten Reflections Booklet will be available in the church office on Sunday, February 11 for hard-copy pickup. A \$5.00 donation would be appreciated to offset printing costs. A PDF version of the booklet will also be available on the home page of the St. John's website (www.sjucc1811.org).

Throughout this issue of *The Spirit*, you will find opportunities to love and learn, worship and witness, welcome and serve. We are engaging the themes of our strategic plan in new and creative ways. And we are indeed growing in love of God and neighbor.

HANDBELL RINGING IN AMERICA - Part 2

Last month I wrote about how handbells got to America and this month I would like to give you some information about the organization called Handbell Musicians of America.

The AGEHR or Handbell Guild of English Handbell Ringers was formed in 1954. This group began with the love and enthusiasm for Handbells in America which sprang from the hand of Margaret Shurcliff in Boston. Margaret introduced many of her friends to the joys of handbell ringing as she formed the Beacon Hill Ringers which included five of her six children.

In 2010 the AGEHR changed their name to the Handbell Musicians of America or HMA. The United States was divided into 12 regional areas with a mission to unite people through the musical art of handbell and hand chime ringing. We are located in region 2 which includes Pennsylvania, New York and New Jersey. The idea was for each region to work together for the good of handbell ringing with having concerts and festivals together in these three states.

The HMA has a most prestigious award, the Honorary Life Membership, which they bestow upon outstanding handbell musicians. So far, 41 people have been honored with this award. These people have made many major contributions to the Guild. One such person was Donald Allured who we had her as a clinician for our musicians in the 1980's. Other winners of this award have written music and have had playing careers during their lives.

SPIRITUAL DEEPENING

- Diana Kongkeattikul writes a weekly devotion that is shared with the youth and the adult church school class.
- Carol Yarema and Diana Kongkeattikul decorated Fellowship Hall and the Sanctuary for the Christmas Season to enhance our worship spaces.
- Dale Myers is coordinating the production of a booklet for the Lenten Season featuring member reflections, historical information, and spiritual nuggets.
- The prayer chain is advertised weekly and coordinated by the office staff. We continue to pray with and for one another.

ENERGIZE PARTICIPATION

- Discussion has started about hosting a poverty simulation workshop with other churches.
- A task force has met and is making progress on reviewing the governance and leadership teams needed to succeed in reaching our goals. Our hope is to have a presentation ready for the congregational meeting in June 2024.

- On January 28, John Widmann offered an organ recital in the Sanctuary.

- February 13 is our annual Pork & Sauerkraut Dinner (dine-in and carry out options available).
- On February 17, there will be a Valentine's Day Dance (donations accepted).
- St. John's will host the Salvation Army Auxiliary Fabric Fair in May 2024.

FINANCIAL SUSTAINABILTY

- Camp Ministry has developed a new rental fee structure for 2024. A team has been formed to apply for grant money through the Penn Central Conference to assist campers and camp maintenance issues.
- St. John's has engaged outside help with Berkstresser Realty and Ghost Writer LCC (see page 11 for more information).
- Online giving and other giving opportunities are regularly advertised. A QR code has been added to our publications to make online giving even easier.

Where Does Your Money Go? Let's talk money!

Oh, yes. Money is such a dirty word. We could disguise the topic by calling it stewardship, but stewardship is more than money. Stewardship is giving of your time, talent, and treasures. And while we need gifts of time, talent, and treasures; the truth is that like your own personal household, our church cannot survive without money. Mission and ministry require funding. Your gifts and offerings make it possible for St. John's to remain a vital part of our congregants' lives and our community.

Unless money is labeled for a specific use when it is gifted, it is deposited into the church's General Fund. This "bucket" supports the overall mission and ministry of the church. Utilities, wages and benefits, office supplies, and most ministry expenses (among other things) are covered under the General Fund. Both community outreach and in-house fellowship are funded by general fund monies that are flagged for the ministry teams supporting those events. The bulk of monetary offerings falls into this fund. Gifts to the General Fund provide St. John's with the greatest flexibility in managing our income and expenses.

We have a number of special funds that support particular aspects of our life together. These include: Camp Fund; Pastors Discretionary Fund; Patrons of Music; Sponsor-A-Camper; Maintenance; HVAC; Children and Youth; First Fruits; and St. John's Nursery School. You are able to support many of these funds using our online giving platform (Vanco), available through our church website, or by designating contributions to these funds on your check or offering envelope.

The Camp Fund supports our St. John's Camp, enabling us to care for buildings, land, programming and summer camp necessities. Sponsor-A-Camper helps us offer scholarships for young people to attend camp. The Children and Youth Ministry Fund supports education and faith formation, especially for our younger members and friends. The Patrons of Music fund helps us to offer concerts such as the Susquehanna University choir (they'll be coming again to sing at St. John's in March 2025).

The Maintenance Fund supports the basic maintenance of St. John's building and grounds. This money pays for needed repairs and covers costs incurred with maintaining our facility. Plumbing repairs, new lighting, replacing doors, etc. are all supported by this fund. Major projects such as the new HVAC system are typically funded by special fundraising efforts or capital campaign programs (like "Mission Possible").

"First Fruits" offerings are collected each month to support organizations in our local community and beyond. The Pastors Discretionary Fund allows us to help people in our congregation and community with emergency needs. These monies help us to do good within and beyond the walls of our building.

The St. John's Nursey School is a self-sustaining program, meaning it covers its expenses through student tuition payments. Gifts to the nursery school are considered special opportunities to improve or add to playground equipment, update programming supplies, and offer special student events.

So where does your money go? Well, that is up to you. Your offering goes exactly where you ask us to put it. Designated gifts go to specific projects and programs. Undesignated gifts go to the general fund, giving us the greatest flexibility to manage budgeted operating expenses and unbudgeted needs. As you plan future donations to St. John's, please also consider adding to your gift and designating funds for something near and dear to your heart. Any ministry-supporting work that touches you would benefit from additional money marked for just those functions.

Thank you to every St. John's member and friend who supports the church so the church can continue to support ourselves and our community.

Financial Update: Seeking Outside Assistance

Building on the theme of Financial Sustainability as laid out in our Future Together Strategic Plan, St. John's UCC has been exploring options to help us achieve our goals in this area.

Our Consistory recently entered into several agreements to help explore options for meeting our 2024 budget and maintaining our building. One of the agreements is with Ghost Writers, LLC. Pastor Caroline, Scot Orndorff, and trustee Tom Harrison recently met with Kirsten Hubbard and Abby McElhiney of Ghost Writer, LLC to discuss potential grant opportunities for SJUCC. Kirsten indicated that there are a number of private, state and federal grants that might be available to SJUCC. Her firm is familiar with the complexities of grant applications and how to communicate the Organization's need for available funds. Pastor Caroline, Scot and Tom believe SJUCC needs professional guidance and assistance to be successful in this competitive arena. This requires a \$1200 monthly cost and is for a one year period. However, it can be cancelled by either party with 30 days' notice. There is a meeting scheduled at the end of January to consider several projects that may be worthy of grant funding.

The second agreement is with Berkstresser Realty Group to possibly rent some of the space that was vacated when First Start Partnerships moved their three classrooms from our building to the old Lincoln Lanes Building. Pastor Caroline, Harold Collier, and trustee Tom Harrison toured the building with Wayne Berkstresser to show the possible rooms that are available. It was agreed that SJUCC should seek professional help from a realtor to market our space to potential tenants. The agreement is for longer term space/room rental. We agreed to pursue this through June 2024. The cost for any space rented is the first month's rental amount.

The Consistory was unanimous in supporting these options for the financial sustainability of our congregation.

WON'T YOU CONSIDER JOINING IN? OPPORTUNITIES FOR LEARNING AND SERVICE WITH THE OPEN AND AFFIRMING MINISTRY TEAM

We often think of winter months as a time to hunker down with decreased engagement in outside-the-home activities. During the months of February and March, St. John's is challenging you to participate in any one of several activities of varying levels of engagement and learning.

- 1) Beginning in January, the Winter Warmth Drive (headed up by United Way) began to receive items for low income and homeless in our area. Up until February 12, you can make contributions (monetary) or tangibles at the church. Our First Fruits Offering at February 4 worship service will go to this project. If you wish to make a monetary contribution other than at that worship service, you can submit a check up until February 12 so noting that designation. Tangibles can be placed in the carts in our lobby: Food whole grains, seasonings, cooking oils, condiments, flour, sugar, boxed meals, peanut butter, shelf-stable milk, pasta/pasta sauce and canned goods. Personal Care items first aid kits, hand soap, shampoo, conditioner, body wash, deodorant, tissues, toothpaste, laundry detergent, dish soap, paper towels, mittens, gloves, winter hats, socks.
- 2) February is Black History Month. We have scheduled the viewing and discussion of the film "13th" on February 18 here at the church. This event will follow the worship service on February 18 and will include a light lunch. Time period will be approximately three hours, including lunch, viewing and discussion. The documentary film reveals the complexity of, and often a misunderstanding of, the 13th Amendment to the United States Constitution. The ratified amendment in 1865 is often understood to be total freedom for those in enslavement and ruled slavery of any kind as unlawful. However, there was a loophole that has led to the utilization of the 13th as a way for the American incarceration system to deem a form of slavery acceptable as a legal punishment. You will find this an enlightening and profound documentary film. We do ask you to pre-register for this event by February 11th by calling (717-263-8593) or email (manager@sjucc1811.org) to aid in having sufficient lunch supplies.



- 3) Early in March Saturday, March 2, 2024 will be the Penn Central Conference ONA Ministry Team's "Winter Gathering." This will be held at Colonial Park UCC, 5000 Devonshire Rd., Harrisburg, PA with registration at 9:30 a.m. and closing at 3:00 p.m. The featured speaker for this event will be Corinne Goodwin who is founder and Executive Director of Eastern PA Trans Equity Project (a non-profit organization which has a mission of empowering transgender individuals throughout a 26-county area of Eastern Pennsylvania). Workshops will also be part of this gathering. There is NO COST to attend, but they do ask for registration by contacting Steven Roush at scroush2@gmail.com with individual's name, name of church, a contact email and phone number. A free will offering will help cover food & Samp; speaker costs.
- 4) Sunday, March 3 St. John's UCC will host a workshop "Skills for Bridging the Divide" with the organization Braver Angels. We live in a polarized political climate that affects all aspects of our lives: how we live, work, worship, and our relationships with family and friends. How do we have better conversations with people we disagree with, especially those on the other side of the political aisle? By learning Skills for Bridging the Divide! This workshop will teach skills for having respectful conversations that: clarify differences; search for common ground; affirm the importance of relationship. Skills for Bridging the Divide is perfect for communities of worship who want to reduce the divisiveness of polarization. Respect, not agreement, is an essential key for healthy discussion. As people of faith, we want to be able to reach out to other people with more love and respect. Why should you come? To learn about the perspectives, feelings, and experiences of someone you care about who differs from you politically; to have a sense of satisfaction about how you conveyed your own perspective, feelings, and experiences; to discover some common ground, if it's there. Participants will: practice tone setting skills; listening skills; speaking skills; and handling difficult moments. When and Where: Sunday, March 3, 2-5 pm, here at St. John's UCC (Fellowship Hall). A "snow date" of Sunday, March 10, 2-5 pm, has been selected in case of inclement weather.





Outreach Ministry 2024 Lenten projects

Each year the Outreach Ministry designates three or four recipients of our Lenten First Fruits. This year there are three groups that we have decided to support.

Peru Adopt a school program. St John's association with this program began in 2008 when the Crum's and Powell's visited the school on their trip to Peru. All donations go to the purchase of school supplies for an elementary school in Yamamoto. We continue to receive communications in appreciation of our support. (Check out the three "books" of original artwork made by kids in these schools available at the Welcome Center.)

African Mission Healthcare. This mission is in support of compassionate medical access and treatment in Kenya and Malawi. It is the Mission in which the Jon and Amanda Fielder family serve.

The Women Healthcare Initiative Foundation. This organization's mission: To work with local governments, religious institutions, NGO's and local, national and international stakeholders to empower women and children in Burkina Faso to break the cycle of poverty through healthcare teaching, formal education with basic technical skills, and to offer solutions to improve the quality and delivery of healthcare. The vision is a nation where women come together to overcome health disparities in Burkina Faso.

The proceeds of these offerings by the congregation will be evenly divided between these three programs. Our collection will be during Lent and will end on **March 24th**, **Palm Sunday**. We are very happy to offer this opportunity for global outreach in the life of St John's UCC.

<u>First Fruits in February</u> will be collected for United Way's "Winter Warmth Drive" on Sunday, February 4 and Sunday, February 11. Collection for Lenten offerings will begin on Wednesday, February 14.


