From Pastor Caroline

As I write this newsletter article, we are still in the season of Lent, about to enter into Holy Week. Lent has felt longer and more challenging this year—and not just because I gave up chocolate. The Lenten series we did with other churches in the Conococheague Mission Cooperative (CMC) called "Holy Lament: a Journey toward Joy" was very personal for me. There are days when my own grief feels very raw and I cannot help but lament. Thankfully most days I am able to access joy, to dwell in promise and possibility, and to move forward knowing that love gets the last word. We are together in lament and together in joy.

Those first followers of Jesus experienced a breadth of human emotions: grief and sorrow, surprise and wonder, all in the span of a few days. Jesus' death on the cross on Friday was thought to be the end until Sunday morning, when the women went to the tomb and found that Jesus was not there. Death could not hold him; the tomb could not contain him; Jesus was alive—we do not look for the living among the dead. No matter which Gospel account you read, the message is clear: Alleluia! Christ is risen! Christ is risen indeed! Alleluia!

Easter is the "great joke" that God played on the devil. Or, in the words of *Lord of the Dance*, "they buried my body and they thought I'd gone/but I am the dance and I still go on." We will celebrate "Holy Humor Sunday" on April 7, something we did for the first time in 2023. We will sing and laugh and rejoice that death did not get the last word; love did. Love does.

Easter is also a season: Eastertide. The fifty days following Easter lead us to Pentecost and the gift of the Holy Spirit. We read how Jesus continued to teach us how to live and how to love.

Throughout this issue of *The Spirit*, you will find opportunities to practice living out the love we have for God and our neighbors. I especially want to highlight the Reentry Simulation on April 16 with Franklin Together and Racial Reconciliation of Franklin County and the opportunities listed for community engagement. Our faith compels us to come alongside those who are marginalized, to hear their stories, and to work together to create a just world for all.

I'm also greatly looking forward to the Afternoon Spring Tea on April 13 and extend my heartfelt thanks to all those who are working to make that a smashing success.

Our Strategic Plan invites us to look toward our future with hope, filled with opportunities to serve God, love our neighbors, and care for our world. We are seeking God's grace and guidance as we discern the way forward for our church.

I'll conclude with these words often attributed to John Wesley: "Do all the good you can, By all the means you can, In all the ways you can, In all the places you can, At all the times you can, To all the people you can, As long as ever you can."

I must tell you about our practice room for handbells. It is far too small for the five octave set of handbells and our five octave set of hand chimes that we have in it. Before I knew it two benches were made, painted and brought back to our bell room and the side panels were from the old piano taken out of the church! Problem solved! Not so fast! Our chime ringers wanted to know when they were getting benches for their chime cases to get them off the floor. So back to the drawing board (Tom) to tell him we need three more cases. His answer was "THREE MORE"! So in a few days, three more cases appeared in the bell room having been made by Tom and his helper Muneath Ham. In case you do not know Muneath, she is from Cambodia and awaiting her Green Card from the government to be able to work in the United States. What a blessing and what wonderful people we have in our congregation. The next time you see either one of these persons, please say "THANK YOU" for their wonderful work they do in our church.



SPIRITUAL DEEPENING

- Diana Kongkeattikul's weekly devotional is now posted on our website; a link is located on the home page.
- Carol Yarema hosted a class on depression
- Our Lenten devotional put together by Dale Myers has been well-received. Most of the hard copies were taken (some are still available) and it is also online.
- The prayer chain is regularly advertised, both as an opportunity to share prayer concerns and for those who desire to pray for others. It is coordinated by the office staff.
- If you missed a copy of the Spirit, links for past editions are now available online.

ENERGIZE PARTICIPATION

- ◆ A Poverty Simulation workshop with SCCAP will be held Saturday, June 1, from 10 am to Noon. We are asking other churches and the community to support. We'll need 60 participants plus volunteers for this to be a success.
- A Task Force continues their work reviewing the governance and leadership teams needed for us to succeed in reaching our goals. Our hope is to have a presentation ready for the congregational meeting in June 2024.
- ◆ A retreat/workshop called "Net Engagement" facilitated by Jose Ricardo-Osorio is planned for Saturday, April 20, from 9:30 to 11:30 in Room 116.
- A car show is in the early stages of planning for later this year.
- Church grounds clean up was March 23. Camp clean up is Saturday, April 27.

CONGREGATIONAL CARE

- The jigsaw puzzle exchange (puzzles available in the library room 106) has been well received. Take one or trade one and enjoy a relaxing time.
- Our youth group hosted on March 16 with 26 people attending.
- Lenten services were successfully shared with other churches in our area.
- A group study of "The Purpose Driven Life" by Rick Warren in being planned.
- ◆ The Easter Egg Hunt on Easter Sunday, March 31, will be held at 9:15 am.
- Our annual church picnic is planned for Pentecost Sunday, May 19, after worship.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

- ◆ 75 people attended the Braver Angels workshop "Bridging the Divide" on March 3.
- ◆ Our Afternoon Spring Tea is planned for Saturday, April 13. Space is limited to 128. Make sure to pick up your ticket (s) today!
- ◆ A Mothers' Day Ball is being planned for Saturday, May 10.
- ◆ St. John's provided space for the United Way's Winter Warmth Drive collection to be organized. 3,400 items were donated and distributed along with \$13,310.
- ◆ The screening and discussion of the documentary "13th" led to SJUCC hosting a Reentry Simulation on April 16, 1-4 pm, in partnership with other organizations.
- The Summer Singers are looking for singers; concerts scheduled in the summer.
- ◆ SJUCC will host the Salvation Army Auxiliary's Fabric Fair May 1-4, 2024.
- SJUCC will host a Red Cross Blood Drive on Friday, May 31.

FINANCIAL SUSTAINABILTY

- Camp Ministry has developed a new rental fee structure. We received a grant from Penn Central Conference to assist with camp upgrades and fund scholarships.
- Camp Sticky Bun fundraising is set for April 20 (making) and April 21 (selling).
- St. John's is working with Berkstresser Realty to market our available space. We have two organizations interested in a possible rental opportunity.
- ◆ To assist us in applying for grants, St. John's has engaged Ghost Writer LLC. They have identified several grants and sponsorships we are seeking funding from.
- We are talking more opening about giving and funding our mission. A QR code to our online giving platform is now part of our bulletins and publications.

FAITH AND FINANCES

Many people have the idea that their financial life is separate from their life of faith. But that distinction is not found in scripture. In fact, there is no part of life that is separate from faith. If we look carefully at what Jesus has to say in the gospels, this is especially true of one's handling of finances.

It's amazing how many times Jesus' encounter with someone quickly leads to the importance of the intersection of faith and finances. Two instances of this are Jesus' encounter with Zacchaeus in Luke 19 and Jesus' conversation with the rich man in Mark 10. Zacchaeus, after meeting Jesus says, "Look, half of my possessions Lord, I will give to the poor, and if I have defrauded anyone of anything, I will pay back four times as much" (Luke 19:8). The rich man and Jesus have a conversation that is going very well until Jesus says to him, "You lack one thing; go, sell what you own, and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven, then come, follow me" (Mark 10:21). Sadly, the man cannot part with his possessions. That being the case, he departs from Jesus.

The Bible won't let us imagine a life in which faith and finances live separate lives. Rather, they intersect constantly.

First, our Christian faith must influence how we handle money. The two examples above, Zacchaeus and the rich man, provide perfect examples of how faith in Jesus inevitable leads to living a generous life. God's people are to live and give generously, especially to help those in need. This isn't optional. It is part of what it means to be a follower of Jesus Christ.

Paul writes in 2 Corinthians "And God is able to provide you with every blessing in abundance, so that by always having enough of everything, you may share abundantly in every good work" (9:8). We are called to give generously, to give first to God and God's work in the world, to give regularly, and yes, to be a cheerful giver.

Secondly, the Bible tells us that what we do with our money and possessions impacts our faith. That impact can be positive, or it can be negative.

Luke 12:34 quotes Jesus saying, "For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also". It does NOT say "where your heart is, there your treasure will be also." Read that way, the verse means that if I can only get my heart in the right place, my treasure will follow. That may to true, but it's not what Jesus said. Jesus said that what I do with my treasure will cause my heart to follow along. Where I put my treasure will cause my heart to go there as well. If I put my treasure with Jesus and his work in the world, that will cause my heart to draw closer to Him. Conversely, if I put my treasure in things that have nothing to do with Jesus, my heart will be drawn to those things and away from Him.

Putting faith and finances in perspective is one way, in today's world, that we can live out our beliefs. It also points to our financial offerings as a spiritual practice. We give as a response to the abundance that God has entrusted to our care.

Just so you won't think that all these thoughts are mine, most of this material came from the book "Embracing Stewardship" by Charles Lane and Grace Pomroy.



Celebrating Birthdays at St. John's UCC




Have you wondered about the birthday card showers? Well, here is the latest scoop!






The Narthex and How to Use It

During the last Worship Ministry meeting, there was some discussion about the purpose of the Narthex. The narthex is designed to be a quiet entrance to the Sanctuary where worshipers can receive a bulletin, look at the wall hangings, and see other memories from St. John's past and present. This also provides the opportunity to observe the artistic depiction of the seven days of creation pictured in a stained glass screen. Brochures describing the various elements of our sanctuary are also available to help us learn more about its design, the art work, and the ways it helps us to connect with the Divine.

The Narthex is the area where people get ready to worship and take their seats in the pews. When the church was constructed, the idea was to enter the church via the walkway under the canopy to enter the front doors into the lobby. The lobby was designed to be the place for conversation and fellowship. The narthex is a place of preparation for worship. Today many people enter the sanctuary via the handicapped entrance, which is closer to the parking lot and safer for many people to use. We encourage using the lobby or the parlor (located behind the sanctuary) as ideal places to visit and connect with others before and after the service. This allows the narthex to be less crowded and helps facilitate quiet meditation for those who sit in the sanctuary preparing for worship.

We would welcome your help as a greeter/usher to hand out bulletins and other information about St. John's, especially to those who are joining us for worship as visitors. Anyone who would like to assist and serve as an usher for the 20 minutes or so before worship should contact Don Hendrickson (his contact information is in the directory).
