How we live in the world matters; do not underestimate the power you have to positively impact the lives of people around you.

THE STORY OF THE SONG "CORNERSTONE"

On Sunday, April 14, our bell choir played the accompaniment for our choir to sing the song "Cornerstone" Here is a bit of history behind the song.

It has been said, in somewhat tongue and cheek manner, that there are not new worship songs. Instead, phrases from existing ones get written out, cut up, and throne into the air and slightly rearranged from where they land.

It may be the limitations of the genre that force worship song writers to decline into old hymns and scavenge phrases from the past to introduce some variety and depth. So the story of "Cornerstone" starts back in 1834 when Edward Motes wrote "My Hope is Built on Nothing Less"

In 2012 Reuben Morgan added his own chorus and melody, but took the entire verses as Mote had written them. With all the storms and struggles we face, with the threats and fear that stack up, there is only one thing in which we can put our trust.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

FINANCIAL SUSTAINABILTY

- Interested in using our camp this summer? Rental fees have been updated and are available on the Camp page of our website. A grant has been awarded from Penn Central Conference Outdoor Ministry fund to assist campers and camp upgrades.
- St. John's has engaged Berkstresser Realty. We have a contract being finalized and another interested in a possible rental opportunity for space in our building.

The Pastor's Discretionary Fund: What is it and How it Works

When I came to St. John's in 2018, I was entrusted with a special fund: the Pastor's Discretionary Fund. What is this fund, you may ask? It is a checking account that enables the pastor, on behalf of the congregation, to help those within our church and in our community who need a helping hand with some financial needs.

What kind of needs does the Pastor's Discretionary Fund (PDF) help with?

- Gas and transportation
- Food and nutrition
- Hotel rooms (usually 1-2 nights)
- Medical expenses
- Utilities (water or electric)
- Rent (partial payments)
- Car repairs (partial payments)
- School supplies for kids
- Clothing

Many people in the wider Chambersburg area meet the ALICE criteria: asset limited, income constrained, employed. These are people who work but struggle to survive. ALICE earns above the Federal Poverty Level (FPL), but makes less than what's needed to afford basic essentials. ALICE often earns too much to qualify for government assistance, and there is no room in ALICE's budget for emergency expenses.

Most of the people that the PDF helps fall into this category; people who are doing their best to make it and have an unexpected expense that their budget just won't cover. As a church, we have the ability to help mitigate the struggles people face. I'm honored to be able to help people in a tangible way, financially as well as spiritually. After all, it's hard to convince people that a God they can't see loves them when people in a church they can see don't seem to like them very much.

Your donations to the Pastor's Discretionary Fund make a real difference in the lives of our friends and neighbors. Whether it is a Walmart gift card that helps someone to buy food or gas, clothing or school supplies, a night or two in a safe hotel room, or a check that covers part of someone's rent or utilities, people's lives are positively affected. We are helping to meet the immediate need, while also trying to advocate for structural change to help the 39% of Pennsylvanians who face financial hardship every day, in every county in PA (2021 data, per the United Way).

Thank you for supporting our friends and neighbors through the Pastor's Discretionary Fund. Your donations to our church help to change lives.

We have a wonderful team in our church office that are ready and available to help facilitate your needs.





The Narthex and How to Use It

During the last Worship Ministry meeting, there was some discussion about the purpose of the Narthex. The narthex is designed to be a quiet entrance to the Sanctuary where worshipers can receive a bulletin, look at the wall hangings, and see other memories from St. John's past and present. This also provides the opportunity to observe the artistic depiction of the seven days of creation pictured in a stained glass screen. Brochures describing the various elements of our sanctuary are also available to help us learn more about its design, the art work, and the ways it helps us to connect with the Divine.

The Narthex is the area where people get ready to worship and take their seats in the pews. When the church was constructed, the idea was to enter the church via the walkway under the canopy to enter the front doors into the lobby. The lobby was designed to be the place for conversation and fellowship. The narthex is a place of preparation for worship. Today many people enter the sanctuary via the handicapped entrance, which is closer to the parking lot and safer for many people to use. We encourage using the lobby or the parlor (located behind the sanctuary) as ideal places to visit and connect with others before and after the service. This allows the narthex to be less crowded and helps facilitate quiet meditation for those who sit in the sanctuary preparing for worship.

We would welcome your help as a greeter/usher to hand out bulletins and other information about St. John's, especially to those who are joining us for worship as visitors. Anyone who would like to assist and serve as an usher for the 20 minutes or so before worship should contact Don Hendrickson (his contact information is in the directory).
