From Pastor Caroline

Among my favorite Lenten "cartoons" is one of an older couple reflecting on Lent: The man offers, "The Bible says thou art dust, and to dust thou shalt return" and the woman retorts "That's why I don't dust; it could be someone I know." While a comic way of reflecting on our mortality, I find it appropriate as we prepare for Ash Wednesday on March 5 (though I confess I haven't yet gathered up either the energy or courage needed to dust my house).

Lent is a season of repentance and renewal. I feel the need for renewal a lot these days. I'm trying to fill my own cup with joy and laughter and love; to build resilience and resistance so as to "not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good." Maybe you are in need of these things, too. Thankfully, we're not in this alone; we have each other and we have Jesus.

As I try to "pray more and worry less," I'm working to channel my anxiety into action, my fear into fortitude, and balance the need to be pastoral with the call to be prophetic. I'll be honest: I would rather be a prophet of the resistance than a chaplain of the empire. I know the church is at its best when we are speaking truth to power, rather than allied with it. And no matter how bad it might get, God in Christ shows us that love gets the last word.

Rev. Benjamin Cremer is one of the pastors I turn to when I need inspiration. He writes, "No matter how discouraging the world may be around us or how relentless violence and death seem to be, love will not only triumph and prevail but will get the last word over us all. That is the hope I want to invite you to hold onto as you travel this journey called Lent." The apostle Paul writes in 1 Corinthians 13:13 "Now faith, hope, and love remain – these three things – and the greatest of these is love" (CEB).

We are called to be salt and light; we are called to love our neighbors and our enemies; we are called to be the children of God—generous, forgiving, patient, wise, and kind. I pray that we are able to embody these qualities not only in our worship, but as we live in the world.

Using a special Lenten curriculum called "Bread of Life," we recognize "how Jesus fed people—not just their bodies but their souls—with good news, redemption, and stories of God's kin(g)dom." We will gather together to break bread, savor the divine generosity of God, and rise to share with the world out of the abundance we have received from the bread of life—nourished in body and in spirit. We begin our Lenten journey with worship on Ash Wednesday, March 5 at 6:30 pm and will end it together with Easter on April 20 at 10 am.

We don't always know what the future will hold—but we trust in the One who holds it.

Let us trust in God's power for life, in the love of Jesus Christ, and the sustaining power of the Holy Spirit, being the body of Christ and being the church.

English Hymnody

It was a daring move when, in 1707, Isaac Watts published his first book of hymns. At that time it was the practice of almost every congregation of the Church of England to sing only Old Testament psalms in public worship. However, Watts had grown to dislike this because it restricted the Christian from being able to explicitly celebrate in song all those aspects of the gospel that are fulfilled and illuminated in the New Testament.

In the preface of Hymns and Spiritual songs, Watts addresses the worship situation of his time and offers a defense for writing and publishing new music. Watts is credited with writing something like 750 hymns. But what makes this hymn unique is the particular beauty of its language and imagery, and the power with which it highlights the most significant event in human and personal history – the cross of Jesus Christ our God.

Watts' giftedness for writing hymns, combined with his courage in publishing them, would eventually turn the tide against singing only psalms and set a new standard for Christian worship in the English language. Today Watts is widely recognized as the "Father of English Hymnody"

"When I Survey the Wondrous Cross" is his greatest hymn.

When I Survey the wondrous cross,

On which the Prince of glory died,

My richest gain I count but loss,

And pour contempt on all my pride.

St. John's choir will sing an anthem based on this hymn in our worship service on Sunday April 6. Hope you are there to hear us.

Outreach Ministry 2025 Lenten projects

Each year the Outreach Ministry designates three or four recipients of our Lenten First Fruits. This year there are four groups that we have decided to support.

NETwork Ministries NETwork Ministries is committed to sharing the love of Christ with those who are most vulnerable in our community. They especially seek to equip children and young adults with the skills necessary for these four areas of focus: spiritual growth, academic achievement, life management, and Christian leadership.

Peru Adopt a school program. St John's association with this program began in 2008 when the Crum's and Powell's visited the school on their trip to Peru. All donations go to

the purchase of school supplies for an elementary school in Yamamoto. We continue to receive communications in appreciation of our support. (Check out the three "books" of original artwork made by kids in these schools available at the Welcome Center.)

African Mission Healthcare. This mission is in support of compassionate medical access and treatment in Kenya and Malawi. It is the Mission with which the Jon and Amanda Fielder family have served.

The Women Healthcare Initiative Foundation. This organization's mission: To work with local governments, religious institutions, NGO's and local, national and international stakeholders to empower women and children in Burkina Faso to break the cycle of poverty through healthcare teaching, formal education with basic technical skills, and offer solutions to improve the quality and delivery of healthcare. The vision is a nation where women come together to overcome health disparities in Burkina Faso.

The proceeds of these offerings by the congregation will be evenly divided between these four programs. Our collection will be during Lent and will end on **April 13th**, **Palm Sunday**. Lenten boxes will be available beginning Sunday, March 2. Checks may be made out to St. John's with Lenten Project in the memo line. We are very happy to offer this opportunity for local and global outreach in the life of St John's UCC.

Life, an Offering to God

MANY, many years ago, a Hindu poet wrote:

Love not the world not yet forsake Its gifts in fear and hate. Thy life to God an offering make, And to Him dedicate.

We are all involved in life in its varied aspects and responsibilities. The daily routine carries its own toll of energies and processes. The struggle for bread and shelter continues to the very end to beat at our lives and our very spirits with an insistence that cannot be ignored. For many there are additional cares that go beyond the demands of our own personal survival and encompass the tender threads of the lives of others to whom we are bound by ties of blood and birth. Beyond all this, there are areas of the common life in which we must do our part in order that the very fabric of society may be maintained against collapse and disintegration. There are dreams, hopes and yearnings which possess our lives, calling us away from the usual round and the common tasks. Amid all these pressures and many more, life for us becomes entangled or again and again bogs down. There comes a moment when we are in utter revolt—something deep within us becomes tired, weary, exhausted, and finally, outraged. What we long for in deep anxiety is some haven, some place of retreat, some time of quiet where our bruised and shredded spirits may find healing and restoration. One form that this anxiety takes is to hate life and to fear tomorrow. For such the ancient poet speaks a timely word. All such experiences are a part of our experience and must be regarded as life's gifts. Whatever may be the uniqueness of man's experience, we must remember that nothing that is happening to us is separated from that which is common to us. The answer to all of this reaction of deep anxiety and anguish is, says the poet: "Thy life to God an offering make, and to Him dedicate." And the meaning of this? If I make of my life and offering and a dedication to God, then this dedication will include all my entanglements and involvements. There follows, then, a radical change over my entire landscape and miraculously I am free at my center. It is for this reason that it is well, again and again, to re-establish my dedication, to make repeatedly an offering of my life. I must keep my dedication up to date with my experiencing.

The Personnel Committee is pleased to announce that our new Office Administrator Tonya Schwartz started her employment with us on Tuesday, February 18, 2025.


Tonya spent her whole career working in an office environment. We expect her diverse work experience will be very beneficial to St. John's UCC.





THE CARING CORNER---

WHAT HAPPENED TO CARING COOKS?

People who Care and Cook are still around! What is **missing** is the volunteer who used to coordinate meals for us. Our Caring Cook coordinator

had to 'retire' from this position for a variety of reasons. We observed that over the past several years, there were several instances where a variety of members and friends of the congregation would put together a 'meal train.' These people knew of a need and then reached out to others who might know the person or be interested in cooking, and they created a schedule for the meals and it worked—it worked well! We de-

cided this was a good approach for us to take for the future.

If you are aware of someone who could use **some temporary** help with a few meals because of recent surgery, living alone, loss of a loved one, or other circumstances, we encourage to call that person and make sure they are interested and check on any dietary issues. Then ask folks you know who might help and put the schedule together. And the beautiful thing is, no one has to do this very often, there are no meetings--just emails and phone calls. Typically support is for a few weeks. If it is longer term, other options such as Meals on Wheels might work better.

And of course, there is always the option of sharing something you made with someone you think would benefit without organizing a meal train. This is really a wonderful way to show you care.
