

From Pastor Caroline

I find great comfort in the rhythms of the church year, being in sync with something greater than myself and more spiritual than just the "Pun a Day" daily calendar that lives on my desk. I even have a sticker from Illustrated Ministry with the Church Year to remind me. With the celebration of Pentecost on June 8, we are once more in a new liturgical season: Ordinary Time (aka the Season after Pentecost).

In Ordinary Time, we go back to the stories of Jesus' life among us, his earthly ministry. We have options from within the Hebrew Bible, hearing the words of the prophets, sections of the Torah, or wisdom literature. We read the letters written to early Christians who were trying to deal with their disagreements. And we pray the psalms, the words of the people. That's part of the beauty of following the Revised Common Lectionary; we are meant to hear all parts of the Word, not just from sections that we like.

We read the messy parts of scripture and we find ourselves. We see ourselves in the complicated characters. We recognize ourselves in the questions. We discover that we, too, are called out and called in, by a God who loves more than we can possibly imagine. Engage with the stories of scripture and embrace the goodness and grace of our Creator.

I was privileged to attend the Festival of Homiletics (a preaching conference) in Atlanta May 12-15. The theme "Preaching to Heal the Divide" put me in conversation with sacred texts that can help us to make sense of this moment and how people of faith can navigate it, among them Genesis 45: 1-15; Acts 27; Isaiah 58:1-12; and Psalm 137. I heard lectures and attended workshops, including one on The Moral Teachings of Jesus (I purchased David P. Gushee's new book "The Moral Teachings of Jesus: Radical Instruction in the Will of God). I'm going to take time to really sit with and absorb what I heard and how it informs my calling as pastor, teacher, and friend. Thank goodness for sabbatical.

I began serving St. John's UCC on May 1, 2018. Now, after seven years together, it is time for me to have a season of rest and renewal. My call agreement provides for three months of sabbatical; I have chosen to take six weeks this summer and six weeks in 2026 (exact dates TBD). Rev. Peter Emig, retired UCC preacher, will provide the majority of pulpit coverage while I am away. He will also be available for any pastoral emergencies.

I am grateful for the opportunity to travel and to stay home. I will be attending UCC General Synod in Kansas City, MO, voting on the resolution to form the Keystone Conference and seeing many friends and colleagues. I will be visiting my brother and friends in Iowa, which will be wonderful. I'm also hoping to make a trip to Colorado to see my dad's sister. I also think the cats (Leah and Naomi) will be happy to have me around more than usual. We'll see what else might "fill my cup" and help sustain me in ministry!

Let us together hold onto these words: "Go forth into the world in peace. Be of good courage. Hold fast to that which is good. Render to no one evil for evil. Strengthen the fainthearted. Support the weak. Help the afflicted. Honor all people. Love and serve the Lord, rejoicing in the power of the Holy Spirit."

SOME INFORMATION ABOUT PENTECOST

Pentecost is significant in both old and new testaments.

Pentecost is actually a Greek term for a festival known in the Old Testament as the Festival of Weeks. The Greek word means 50 and refers to the fifty days that have elapsed since the wave offering of Passover. The Feast of Weeks celebrated the end of the grain harvest. More interesting, however is its use in Joel and Acts.

Looking back to Joel's prophesy

(Joel 2:28-32) and forward to the promise of the Holy Spirit in Christ's last words on earth before His ascension into Heaven (Acts 1:8).

Pentecost signals the beginning of the church age.

June First Fruits

'I was hungry and you gave me food to eat. I was thirsty and you gave me a drink. I was a stranger and you welcomed me. I was naked and you gave me clothes to wear. I was sick and you took care of me. I was in prison and you visited me.' 'I assure you that when you have done it for the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you have done it for me.' (Matthew 25:35-36, 40)

Jesus encourages us to ensure that the needs of the most vulnerable among us are being met. In a time when the cost of living and affording basic necessities are going up, we have the opportunity to ensure that "the least of these" are fed, clothed, and sheltered. The Gospel is often demonstrated in tangible acts of service and care.

First Fruits for June will be donated to the Fayetteville Food Pantry. The Food Pantry is hosted in St. Paul Evangelical Lutheran Church in Fayetteville and is operated in partnership with South Central Community Action Program (SCCAP). St. Paul supports the operation and management of the small emergency food pantry, which is stocked with non-perishable foods. St. Paul members provide volunteer staffing, in partnership with others in the surrounding area. The food pantry serves upwards of more than 120-130 families in the Brownsville, Fayetteville, North Mont Alto, and South Mountain communities. The food is available to anyone who has a need; there are no eligibility requirements. This pantry is entirely financed and stocked through local donations, such as our congregation's collection with the Reverse Advent Calendar in December.

Your contributions help to reduce food insecurity in our communities. Jesus is the Bread of Life, who feeds empty bellies and meets both physical and spiritual needs.

What Happens to the Flowers at the Foot of the Cross?

When folks sponsor the flowers at the foot of the cross, they can choose to donate all or part of the flowers for distribution. What does that mean—it means some volunteers will create bouquets of flowers to share with others. This can include folks who are hospitalized, in rehab, have a significant birthday, or just need a happy visit.

We could use more volunteers to help with this effort.

By volunteering you <u>are not committing</u> to meetings or specific Sundays. You are committing to help when it works for you.

Each month our volunteers receive a list of the Sunday's that have flowers scheduled. They choose which Sunday they can cover. The more volunteers we have, the less often we need to cover.

There is a phenomenon among some penguin species called "Pebble-Giving" where male penguins present a shiny pebble to their prospective mate as a sign of intent to build a nest together. If the female penguin accepts the gift and places the pebble in her nest, the pair will continue to build the nest together using pebbles to create a mound that protects their eggs. It is in fact, an expression of care and affection.

In current trends, people have adopted similar habits now referred to as "Pebbling" where friends and family gift small tokens such as texts, memes, or photos to each other in an effort to brighten someone's day. It's a modern day "Thinking of You" card, if you will.

On a wider scale, similar pebbling techniques are carried out within our church to support, celebrate, and encourage our neighbors in need. We collect donations for First Fruit. We offer summer camp to children. We collect pet food for the animal shelter, gather plastic bags for SCCAP, and hang Angel Tags on a Christmas tree in our long-standing support of the Salvation Army. The Called to Care program lifts up our members in need of emotional support. Sermons and Bible studies are prepared for spiritual support. Small groups are constantly in development to offer deepened community engagement and membership enrichment. Our complete list of pebbles is too long to list here in its entirety.

<u>1 Thessalonians 5:11</u> says, "So encourage each other and build each other up, just as you are already doing." Pebbles build and express our love for each other. What a humbling and joyous testament to the work of St. John's and to our loving God!

Every dollar collected, every program offered, and every sermon preached is another pebble that is gathered to build the nest that has become St. John's home. We are home to many who have found us already and many more yet to come. May you always have an abundance of pebbles that remind you of the great God we serve and the care and affection that others have for you.




