From Pastor Caroline

In the excellent resource "A Sure Foundation: Resources for the Relationship Between Pastors and Congregations," Pastor Roy M. Oswalt provides several reasons as to why a congregation should want its pastor to have a sabbatical leave:

"A sabbatical...encourages longer pastorates; refocuses ministry; contributes to a pastor's spiritual growth; prevents burnout; establishes new patterns for work and self-care; and promotes congregational self-sufficiency."

Any one of these reasons would be enough, I think, to promote and provide a sabbatical. My dad served in parish ministry for 40 years—and only had one sabbatical. I'm grateful that we have agreed on these six weeks in 2025 as a time for rest and renewal.

We have lived through a lot in the seven years that I have served St. John's UCC. I never imagined pastoring in a pandemic and all that would be required "for such a time as this." We underwent a period of study and conversation that culminated in becoming an Open and Affirming (ONA) congregation. We embarked on an intentional visioning process and created our Future Together Strategic Plan, which we are working hard to implement. We have changed our governance structure and I give thanks to those who are serving on the Council and the Missional Standing Committees (Spiritual Life, Congregational Care, and Community Engagement). And in the midst of this work, I have been grieving my dad.

Ministry is not an easy profession. I have never doubted my calling; yet there are days when I am spiritually, emotionally, and physically exhausted. I would prefer to "burn on, and not out" as one of my favorite podcasts, "Burn It All Down" used to say. These six weeks of sabbatical, from June 30 to August 10, will be a time for me to refocus and recharge.

What will I be doing? What do I hope to gain? I looked into several opportunities for travel, including to the Iona Community in Scotland, and still hope to incorporate those things into my six weeks of sabbatical in 2026. Primarily, this year I will be spending time with family and friends, attending UCC General Synod in Kansas City, MO as a delegate from the Penn Central Conference, reading many books, and taking day trips to places close to home. Plus, spending time with my two cats, Leah and Naomi, whose presence and purrs always help to ground and center me. And, perhaps most importantly, I plan to enjoy lots of naps.

I thank the Council and Personnel Committee, who have worked with me to make the arrangements for pastoral care coverage, worship leadership, and other responsibilities. Rev. Peter Emig, retired UCC minister, will preach and lead worship during the Sundays I am away, with the exception of July 20, where Ernie Welch will preach and Jerry Thomason will be the worship leader. Pastor Peter will also be available for any pastoral emergencies.

As we spend these next six weeks apart from one another, I invite you to participate with me in the practice of breath prayers. They are means to connect with God and our bodies. Inhale. Fill your whole self with breath. Feel the air in your lungs. Exhale slowly and fully.

Inhale: Keep my hand steady Exhale: on the work that is mine to do

Inhale: Sincerity over cynicism, Exhale: faithfulness over despair

Inhale: I will not waver in fear's strong winds, Exhale: but remain rooted in your Love.

This month, as we celebrate Independence Day, we can relish the freedoms we take for granted, including freedom of speech, religion, and assembly.

At the same time, as Christians we remember not only Jesus' command to love our neighbors as ourselves (Mark 12:31), but also to do unto others as we would have them do to us (Matthew 7:12). The "neighbors" and "others" certainly include those who hold different ideas on issues of the day.

How can we celebrate our freedom of expression in the context of Jesus' commands?

Listen carefully, being open to another person's ideas.

FINANCIAL SUSTAINABILTY

- Ghostwriter, LLC continues to help us apply for grants. We recently received funding for projects at St. John's Camp and to improve sound quality and hearing accessibility at St. John's (primarily in the Sanctuary).
- We are actively exploring the repair of our parking lots and access road. The Council
 and Finance Committee have been obtaining quotes and reviewing options.
- Online giving and other giving opportunities are regularly advertised. A QR code is placed in our publications. Finance-related articles are included in every Spirit.
- Jessica and Friends are pursing licensure for their adult day program.

Gratitude Sunday is planned for August 24 starting with a Pancake breakfast.


The team focused on ways for all members to have opportunities to join our journey. Working together and participating in small groups are the foundation of our congregation.



WHAT IS COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT AT ST. JOHN'S?

Sometimes it is helpful to review and contemplate in what ways we support our community, as a body professing the desire to live out our mission of service to others. Often in our coming to worship services, engaging in meetings, and financially supporting various activities, we lose sight of the total picture of those whom we reach out to support. For many years, St. John's UCC has carried a budget line item categorized as "Benevolence." Recipients of these funds have changed off and on throughout the years and has primarily been under the purview of "Outreach." This ministry annually reviewed the distribution of these funds on behalf of the congregation. Several years ago, in addition to this regular budgeted amount, we began a monthly First Fruits Offering recipient to which we presented the total collected during that month.

As we have recently transitioned and established a Standing Committee of Community Engagement, we wish to highlight where these funds have recently been used. And, we wish to emphasize that in addition to continuation of financial support to many varied programs and agencies, Community Engagement encourages members and friends of St. John's to find an area or two in which you may be willing to directly engage in some type of volunteer/service in our community. We acknowledge that many of our members/friends already have some direct engagement, and we hope to increase our visibility in this active way.

During our Lenten season, we reach out into a more global perspective with our Lenten Offering spanning several weeks between Ash Wednesday and Easter.

In our desire to keep communication open with you, we are highlighting those programs and agencies which we have supported over these last several years via the "Benevolence" budget funds: Women in Need, United Churches of Chambersburg; Emergency Needs Fund (Salvation Army); Franklin County Jail Ministry; Occupational Services (OSI); Meals on Wheels; Maranatha Food Pantry; Five Talents; Fayetteville Volunteer Fire Dept.; SCCAP (South Central Community Action Programs); Boys and Club of Chambersburg; and Pastor's Discretionary Fund.

A portion of the **Benevolence funds** also goes to: Glenn Schultz Scholarship; Hoffman Homes for Youth; St. John's Steve Hoffman Scholarship; Neighbors in Need*, One Great Hour of Sharing OCWM*; (Our Church's Wider Mission) *; (*UCC special offerings).

During this past year, we have supported the following via our **First Fruits and Lenten Offerings:** Homeless Matters; Diaper Depot; Race Against Poverty; Sponsor A Camper;
Maranatha Food Pantry; NETwork Ministries; Fayetteville Food Pantry; Heifer Project; Angel Tree;
Hoffman Homes for Youth; Peru School; Burkina Faso Women Healthcare Initiative
Foundation; and African Mission Healthcare; and United Way's "Stuff the Bus."

(At the beginning of the month we attempt to apprise members and friends of the recipient and their mission).

It is important to note that in addition to these efforts which have been led by the Outreach Ministry, our Invitational Ministry and Open and Affirming Ministry have also broadened our areas of support in the community.

1) Activities and events planned and implemented by **Invitational Ministry** have provided generous financial support to many agencies and programs.

Invitational Ministry activities have generated funds supporting many programs: e.g. St. John's Book Sale providing Habitat for Humanity with generous financial support as well as building relationships with others who engage in the book sale each spring organized by Community Legal Services, having fostered a relationship between St. John's and this community service.

The Dance Group; Mothers' Day Ball; Church Picnics; Civil War Ball; Pancake Breakfast; Family Fun Day; Fall Tea; Craft night; Chili Cook Off; No Tricks Just Treats; Cookie Walk; Backpack Program helping to feed children on weekends; Pork and Sauerkraut Dinners; Dance Classes; Pickle Ball on site; Spring Tea.

2) Open and Affirming has led the path to our Covenant of Welcome and Affirmation and provides support to other resources in our community addressing the needs of the marginalized.

Open and Affirming has lent its personnel and financial support to Race Against Poverty, Pride Fest, showing films (e.g., "Join or Die"), ONA Sunday. As a congregation, we all have become participants in the welcoming of marginalized community residents, including our LGBTQ+ friends.


As we have begun this transition, we have also expanded the Community Engagement umbrella to include the Camp Ministry, thus lending support to:

Sponsor a Camper First Fruits, Weekend Adventure at Camp; Camp Paint Party and Picnic; Sticky Bun Sale; Camps Kum-Ba-Yah, Camp Noah.

Other new activities which have just begun and fall under Community Engagement are Learning more about Sweet Grace Ministries; Jessica and Friends utilizing our facility; Snacks provision to Network Ministries; Cold Weather Shelter volunteers.

St. John's also lent direct and financial support to the partnership of Menno Haven and Habitat for Humanity in the completion of a home for a couple of our members.

SO --- COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT takes on many foci and ways in which to engage. We applaud each of you who have stepped up over the years as we review and evaluate where best to support our local, and in some cases global, services. May we continue to prayerfully consider, in our review and evaluations, where we might best lend financial support and onhands assistance in our love and service to others in our local community. We celebrate the integration of these previously established ministries at St. John's UCC into a collaborative effort in this journey and we welcome your continued support as we move forward!








Dear St. John's Family,
