#### From Pastor Caroline

My first semester of seminary included several introductory survey classes: Introduction to the Old Testament I, Introduction to Pastoral Care, and History of Early Christian Thought. Having not been a religion major, much of what we covered in the church history class was new to me. Honestly, I've forgotten a lot of it. It isn't necessarily something that I use in my regular routine. It has been a delightful surprise to re-discover this history alongside folks who participate in the Monday afternoon book study. Diana Butler Bass's book "A People's History of Christianity: the Other Side of the Story" is an engaging, accessible read.

In a time when it can feel overwhelming and exhausting, and like we are the first people to be faced with such challenges (and massive upheaval), it is helpful to know that we are not the first Christians to try to navigate such times. We can look to our ancestors in faith, to their example of steadfast love for God and neighbor, and the practical strategies they employed "for such a time as this." We, too, can channel "lovingkindness" and work to "be the light" in dark places. Christianity is, after all, meant to help us to live lives of meaning and purpose, growing closer to the Divine and to one another.

Several of the themes in our Future Together strategic plan echo this sentiment: spiritual deepening (growing closer to God) and congregational care (growing closer to one another). Our efforts at community engagement and energizing participation also matter; they are the engines that drive our outreach within and beyond our property and grounds. And financial sustainability is a reality we have been working hard to address. I encourage you to take a look each month at the Future Together Progress Report. We seek to be transparent as we live into our Strategic Plan, especially as we look toward goals in 2026, 2027, and beyond.

And so, we do our best to find ways to sustain the mission and ministry of our church. Our fall Congregational Meeting is **Sunday, November 9**. We will vote to adopt the budget for 2026. Both a line-item budget and a narrative budget (aka "mission spending plan") are in the Congregational Meeting packet. Please, save November 9 on your calendar; review the materials provided; and help St. John's to thrive, for we are "building the church of the future."

October 2025 was an incredibly busy month at St. John's, culminating with the Habitat for Humanity Book Sale on October 24, 25, and 26. The check presentation to Habitat for Humanity will be held during worship on Sunday, November 9. November will be busy, as we keep dreaming, creating, and showing up for the work of love, especially in Advent.

We will celebrate Totenfest on Sunday, November 23, the last Sunday in the church year. Watch for an e-blast with more information about this special memorial observance. Advent begins on Sunday, November 30. We will be using Illustrated Ministry's *Dare to Dream* curriculum, knowing that there is work in the waiting in this season—"tending to the world, naming injustice, and nurturing seeds of hope that haven't yet bloomed." Hope is embedded in daily work, kindness, and prayer. May we hold both longing and courage in the same breath, waiting and working for the "world to change."

#### Nearer, My God, to Thee

This hymn is one of the most enduring and deeply moving hymns ever written--- a personal prayer of longing to be closer to God, even through suffering or sorrow. The text was written by Sarah Flowers Adams, a British actress-turned-poet and devout Christian. She wrote the hymn in 1841 while living in Essex, England, for inclusion in a hymnal compiled by Rev. William Johnson Fox.

Adams drew inspiration from the story of Jacob's dream of Bethel (Genesis 28:10-22), where the patriarch saw a ladder reaching to heaven and received the promise of God's presence. The hymn's progression—rising "still all my song shall be, nearer, my God, to thee" – is a journey from hardship to hope, from earth to heaven.

The mostly commonly sung tune for the hymn in American churches is "Bethany", composed in 1856 by Lowell Mason, a leading figure in early American sacred music. The union of Adam's poetic depth and Mason's tender melody has made this hymn a powerful expression of faith for over a century and a half.

The hymn is famously associated with solemn moments in history—perhaps most poignant with reports that it was played by the ship's band as the RMS Titanic sank in 1912. Yet its message is not of despair, but of ultimate trust in God's nearness through all circumstances.

Hope you enjoyed hearing our bell choir play this beautiful hymn on October 26 during our church service that day.

#### Focus on Finance - November 2025

What is a narrative budget? How can this be a helpful tool in our stewardship journey?

A "Narrative Budget" or "Mission Spending Plan" describes how a congregation uses its finances for mission and ministry. The numbers are the same as the line-item budget; yet it tells the story of our church's work in a different way. Stories help to paint the picture of how our funds are actually used to worship, witness, learn, love, welcome, and serve.

Narrative budgets help us to see how our giving fits into our theology, a biblical theology of stewardship. We are encouraged not only to give of our resources (our treasure), but also of our time and talent. Such gifts expand our mission and ministry in real and living ways.

Stewardship is part of the relationship we each have with God, Christ, and the Holy Spirit. How we use our time, talent, and treasure is part of our call as disciples. Jesus says in Matthew 6:21, "For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."

A narrative budget is a tool that helps to provide a vision of how we will use our resources to fund God's plan for our church. Each of the narrative categories have the potential to connect us to Christ in a meaningful way—that is why our church exists. To grow in love of God and neighbor.

Our 2026 Mission Spending Plan is split into six categories: Praising God in Worship and Music; Teaching and Nurturing Discipleship; Connecting to One Another; Connecting to the Community; Reaching Out in Service; and Managing Our Building and Grounds.

Copies of the Mission Spending Plan (aka Narrative Budget) are included as part of the Congregational Meeting Packet alongside the line-item budget. We hope you will find it a helpful resource that tells the story of our church in more than just dollars and cents.

Remember: The church is involved in mission and ministry, and mission and ministry need funding. Thank you for your support of our mission and ministry.

#### **COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT**


- The Wired Word Church School class prepares and provides a meal for NETwork

#### **Hoffman Homes Holiday Gift Program**

St. John's UCC has long been a supporter of Hoffman Homes, located outside of Littlestown, PA. Hoffman Homes is a non-profit organization that provides both inpatient and outpatient behavioral health treatment, educational services and other county-funded residential-based services to youth, young adults, and their families across the commonwealth. Several St. John's folks have served on the Board in the past, including Rev. Glenn Schultz, Mary Moyer, and Lee Powell. Pastor Caroline is a current Board member. This year, St. John's will help with the Holiday Gift Program, spreading holiday cheer to the youth and young adults in care and make some of their holiday wishes come true. We have agreed to take 20 tags representing twenty young people. Gifts/gift cards are both accepted, with the following guidelines.

- -Do not wrap the gifts. Simply place each youth's gift(s) in one bag and attach the gift tag provided for each youth.
- -Do not provide items that could potentially be dangerous to these youth (i.e. spiral bound journals and/or sketchbooks, glass, mirrors, pencil sharpeners, etc.). Art sets are okay. Staff will remove potentially dangerous items for safety. If you are uncertain about an item, please reach out to Hoffman Homes at 717-359-7148.

These gifts/gift cards are due back to St. John's by **Monday, December 1**. Pastor Caroline will arrange transportation of these items to Hoffman Homes by December 3.


Camp Noah for grades K, 1, & 2 will be a day camp June 22-26, 2026 at a cost of \$125.

#### "Holy Manners for Our St. John's United Church of Christ Faith Community"

First introduced to SJUCC during a workshop on Healthy Congregations, the idea of a Behavioral Covenant has been part of our Future Together Strategic Plan since Fall 2023. Under the stewardship of Lloyd Beers and Connie Morrill-Hair, a draft of "Holy Manners for Our St. John's United Church of Christ Faith Community" (a Behavioral Covenant) has been developed. This summer, members of the Wired Word class helped to shape this document—and now it comes to the congregation. Copies of the drafted document are available in the Narthex and by request from the church office.

#### What is a behavioral covenant?

A behavioral covenant is a written compact between an organization and its members that serves as a formal, binding agreement regarding personal, interpersonal and organizational conduct. In other settings, similar agreements take the form of policy documents. Examples include; Code of Conduct, Code of Ethics, Workplace Behavior or Community Guidelines, Principles of Integrity, just to name a few. In organizational settings, these published behavioral expectations presume civil and professional behavior on the part of individuals and the organization.

#### What is a behavioral covenant designed to do?

The St. John's UCC behavioral covenant entitled "Holy Manners for Our St. John's United Church of Christ Faith Community" is designed to promote a positive, caring environment by offering a framework for civil behavior and holy manners in all personal and group interactions. The covenant also serves as a reminder of our responsibilities where instances of disagreement arise. In a time in which divisions are increasing, we at St. John's UCC seek to come together in unity (not uniformity) as a church community, and walk and work with one another in love.

#### How it will a behavioral covenant encourage us to be our best selves?

As a document grounded in scripture, "Holy Manners" calls us to reflect the teachings of Jesus and his disciples, and to commit to the greatest commandments. By agreeing to the ten items contained in the covenant, we, as a congregation, are called to love one another, unite as a family, welcome everyone, practice and promote truth, respect, and understanding in communication, and be personally responsible in avoiding conflict. Finally, we are called to act with peace and love for the wellbeing of the congregation. "Holy Manners for Our St. John's United Church of Christ Faith Community" is a solemn covenant that acknowledges our belief in God, our bond in Christ, the guidance of the Holy Spirit, and strength of our family united in faith.

#### **News from the Mercersburg Association**

First UCC in Carlisle will host the fall meeting of the Mercersburg Association of the Penn Central Conference (Keystone Conference as of January 1, 2026) on **Sunday, November 2.** This will be a hybrid gathering with a Zoom option for attendees to use. As our Association is geographically spread out, we are excited to offer multiple options for participation.

Each church has two delegates, in addition to their pastor. <u>If you are interested in serving as a delegate to this meeting, please let Pastor Caroline know.</u>


We give thanks for those churches and pastors who serve alongside us and we look forward to this time of relationship building and decision making.

#### The Keystone Conference Has a New Logo!

Earlier this year, even before the vote in July by the 35th General Synod to recognize the merger of the four Pennsylvania Conferences to create the Keystone Conference, the Keystone Working Group decided that we needed a logo that everyone would easily recognize. The four Conference Ministers narrowed down the 24 designs that were submitted to four that were presented to the Transitional Board of Directors at their first meeting on August 1. They chose a design divided into fourths with different colors representing the four existing Conferences that were coming together to form the new Conference. The Cross and Orb of the United Church of Christ is overlaid on the design. Some changes were suggested for the font, and the final logo was approved by the Board at its September meeting. The colorful keystone design was submitted by George Mamas. George is originally from Philadelphia, the son of Greek

immigrant parents. He graduated from the Art Institute of Philadelphia (1993) and has since worked in various advertising and marketing agencies in the area. He is the proud father of Caroline, Phoenix, and Persephone, and devoted husband of Rev. Leslie Mamas (pastor, Olivet-Schwenkfelder UCC, Norristown). Besides the letterhead shown here, there will be several variations: horizontal or vertical, with or without "United Church of Christ." There will be guidance on how each version is to be used. Also look for Keystone "swag" as we get closer to January 1st and the official launch of the Keystone Conference.

#### **Staff Christmas Gift**






