#### From Pastor Caroline

Christmas was typically my favorite holiday growing up, even though my dad would say that "the Christmas tree was Martin Luther's worst idea." To be fair, we always had a live tree and he once (or twice) had to use duct tape to keep the tree in the stand. The festive nature of Christmas appealed to me- and it still does. There is something comforting about candles and cocoa, decorating and baking, and seeing lights shine in the darkness.

I'm reading Ben Cremer's devotional "Solace: The Birth of Hope in a Time of Longing" this year, inviting us to slow down, listen deeply, and rediscover the solace and hope of Advent in our time of longing. I highly encourage adding something similar to your spiritual practice in this season of preparation, centering us as we await the coming of Christ.

The Advent calendar that I bought this year is filled with trial-size bags of spice. Spices add flavor and complexity to our food. The Reverse Advent Calendar is one way that we can help others to have food to eat, food that tastes good and nourishes both body and soul. You can learn more about this project on page 25; contact Roxanne to request a copy.

With hope, peace, joy, and love, we find our way forward, knowing that God is with us. That is what "Emmanuel" means: "God with us." Our Advent-Epiphany worship theme "The Will to Dream" is rooted in prophetic imagination, the sacred practice to see beyond what it and move toward what could be. The will to dream is, indeed, a "persistent courage to imagine, resist, and rebuild a better world" – the kin(g)dom of God. With vigilant hope, prophetic peace, unexpected joy, and merciful love, we will be inspired, sustained, and empowered this Advent, as the light of Christ comes into the world, getting ever-brighter the closer we get to Christmas. The birth of Jesus is embodied promise and Christ is the light that shines in the darkness, a light that cannot be overcome (John 1:5).

Make sure to have these St. John's events on your calendars: Christmas Ornament Making on Monday, December 1; Cookies for Kids (f/k/a the Cookie Walk) on Saturday, December 6; Christmas Caroling on Sunday, December 7; and Bell Fest on Sunday, December 14.

Midweek Advent services at our partner congregations in the Conococheague Mission Cooperative (CMC) will be held on Dec. 3, 10, and 17. See page 14 for details and locations.

And, St. John's will host a community "Blue Christmas" service on Sunday, December 21 at 3 pm. At Blue Christmas, we come together in quiet, contemplative worship to share our burdens, our sadness, our fears, and gather courage to move onward and forward.

Our Christmas Eve worship will be at 6:30 pm in the Sanctuary (the musical prelude will begin at 6:15 pm). This will be a blended service, with both contemporary and traditional music. We witness to the light of Christ and take that light back out into the world.

In the midst of uncertainty, anxiety, and pain, we choose love: for God and our neighbors.

Let us wait. Let us watch. Blessed Advent, Merry Christmas, and Happy New Year! *Peace, Pastor Caroline* 



### **History of Handbells**

Handbells really started many years ago with simple gourds which were struck with a stick of wood. Eventually they were crafted with clay, wood and stone. Small metal bells can be traced back to 3000 BC in China and larger bells were present before the birth of Christ.

Hundreds of years later in the middle ages the handbell was changed into a form more akin to what we now know and indeed handbells were then one of the basic musical instruments of the church of the day. The modern handbell was developed by Robert and William Cor in England during the early seventeen hundreds and later into what we know and use today. In the United States the Schulmerick company started to make handbells in the early 1960's. In 1974 the Malmark company also started to manufacture handbells. Both companies are located in southeastern Pennsylvania.

Would you like to hear many handbells played together? Well, the chance is coming to St. John's UCC on December 14 at 7 PM.

We will have four handbell choirs all playing together to make beautiful music. Come and hear our concert!

### **Hoffman Homes Holiday Gift Program**

St. John's is a long time supporter of Hoffman Homes, located outside of Littlestown, PA. Hoffman Homes is a non-profit organization that provides both inpatient and outpatient behavioral health treatment, educational services and other county-funded residential-based services to youth, young adults, and their families across the commonwealth. Several St. John's UCC folks have served on the Board in the past, including Rev. Glenn Schultz, Mary Moyer, and Lee Powell. Pastor Caroline is a current Board member. St. John's is helping with the Holiday Gift Program, spreading holiday cheer to the youth and young adults in care, making some of their holiday wishes come true. A tree with these tags is set up in the church office. Gifts/gift cards are both accepted, with the following guidelines:

- -Do not wrap the gifts. Simply place each youth's gift(s) in one bag and attach the gift tag provided for each youth.
- -Do not provide items that could potentially be dangerous to these youth (i.e. spiral bound journals and/or sketchbooks, glass, mirrors, pencil sharpeners, etc.). Art sets are okay. Staff will remove potentially dangerous items for safety. If you are uncertain about an item, please reach out to Hoffman Homes at 717-359-7148.

These gifts/gift cards are due back to St. John's by **Monday, December 1**. Pastor Caroline will arrange transportation of these items to Hoffman Homes by December 3.

### Reverse Advent Calendar Mission Challenge

So, what is a Reverse Advent Calendar you might ask. Well, you know an Advent calendar is a countdown to Christmas where a gift is received each day up until Christmas. A reverse calendar teaches our young to give each day rather than to receive. During this season of preparing our hearts to receive the gift of the Christ child we can model that idea of sharing God's love through giving to others. A Reverse Advent Calendar has been created to fill a box of nonperishable food items to be donated to the Food pantry at St. Paul Lutheran Church in Fayetteville, part of the SCCAP program. This program feeds more than 150 families each month in Fayetteville, Mont Alto, Waynesboro and South Mountain.

Families, church groups and church ministries are being challenged to fill a box and model this spirit. Last year we filled 17 boxes!!!!! This year the need is even greater. Wrapped boxes will be available or any box can be used. All boxes are asked to be delivered to our church by Dec. 24<sup>th</sup> so they can be blessed at the Christmas Eve service. The Youth will deliver these and tour the Food Bank on Dec. 27<sup>th</sup>, meeting at the church at 10:00 am to load. A pizza party will be held at Carretti's LWE, afterwards.
