#### From Pastor Caroline

Merry Christmas and Happy New Year! I hope you've had a wonderful holiday, welcoming Jesus into our hearts, lives and world. Long after we have taken down the decorations and put away the presents, Christmas continues. As Christian mystic Howard Thurman writes, "I will light candles this Christmas. Candles of joy, despite all the sadness. Candles of hope where despair keeps watch. Candles of courage where fear is ever present. Candles of peace for tempest-tossed days. Candles of grace to ease heavy burdens. Candles of love to inspire all of my living. Candles that will burn all the year long." We continue to light the candles: candles that live in our lives and burn in our hearts, flames that will never be extinguished, just like the light of Christ shines in the dark. "Shine, Jesus, Shine" indeed!

As a reminder of the light, and as a way to guide your year, you are invited to choose a Star word from the bulletin board in the lobby that is filled with possibilities. The Congregational Annual Meeting will be held after worship on Sunday, February 8, with a light lunch served in Room 116. We will elect Council members, review reports of our work together over the last year, and make plans for the future of St. John's UCC. We plan to adopt our Behavioral Covenant at the Annual Meeting as well.

Congregational discussion and feedback sessions will be held after worship on Sunday, January 11 and again on Sunday, January 25. The Monday afternoon book study will start a new selection ("Love's Braided Dance: Hope in a Time of Crisis" by Norman Wirzba) on January 12. The Sunday night Bible study will resume on January 11 at 8, finishing up the last chapters of the book of Acts. May we remain united and uniting, growing in love of God and neighbor, and do our best to love, learn, worship, witness, welcome and serve in 2026.

## A Hymn You Surely Know!

This hymn was originally written in German and was first printed in 1677. The hymn is printed in no less that 619 different hymnals.

Some have thought that this hymn was sung by the Crusaders on their way to the Holy Land. However it was probably written in the 17th Century, in German, "Schonster Herr Jesu". Some think the Moravians sang this hymn, fleeing persecution and seeking refuge in Selesia, which is now southwestern Poland. If indeed this is so, this is a remarkable hymn because is says nothing about their suffering and everything about their faith! It expresses great love of the beauties of nature, meadows, woodlands, sunshine, moon light, "and all the twinkling starry host." But Jesus shines brighter, Jesus shines purer, than all the angels heaven can boast!

### A New Chapter in First Fruits and Community Engagement

At our meeting in October 2025, the Community Engagement Committee discussed how we can support organizations in our area doing good work in our community/ world. In addition to the budgeted benevolences which are given each quarter, we are piloting a "quarterly focus" of seasonal giving through physical donations and/or First Fruits. The "Winter" focus for November/December/January was determined to be for Heifer Project, the Angel Tree (Salvation Army), and the Hoffman Homes holiday gift program. With the majority of these programs having wrapped up in December, we ask that your First Fruits contributions go toward the following initiatives:



In November 2025, Pastor Caroline and Tom Kinton met to discuss ways that we at St. John's UCC can help our neighbors who are experiencing food insecurity. In addition to donating items to the United Way's Winter Warmth Drive and participating in the Reverse Advent Calendar challenge, we wanted to explore ways that people who are already coming to St. John's might gain


access to non-perishable food items. Tom built a "Little Free Pantry" and installed it by Parking Lot B, near the entrance to Fellowship Hall. Pastor Caroline has reached out to our Boy Scout Troop, Cub Scout Pack, and Girl Scout Troop for their help in filling this "Little Free Pantry" (or LFP).

We also need **YOUR** help to support and sustain this initiative.



In December 2025, we highlighted the progress we made on the 2023-2025 version of the St. John's UCC Future Together Strategic Plan. As we update the Strategic Plan for 2026 and 2027, we celebrate the continued ways we are living into our mission: to grow in love of God and neighbor.

### SPIRITUAL DEEPENING

- Pastor Caroline leads a weekly book study on Monday afternoons at 1:30 pm. We selected "Love's Braided Dance: Hope in a Time of Crisis" by Norman Wirzba as our next read. - We were blessed to receive new members in October, November, and December. Eight adults now call St. John's UCC their church home.
- The Angel Tree (40 tags) and Hoffman Homes (20 tags) gifts were dedicated in worship on December 7 and November 30. Many thanks go to Lee Powell and Barbara Petroff for delivering our gifts to Hoffman Homes in Littlestown.
- Cookies for Kids (the Cookie Walk) raised \$915 this year with the help from our friends at Habitat for Humanity. Funds will go to support kids in our community.
- The Reverse Advent Calendar food drive donations were blessed at the Christmas Eve service and delivered to the Fayetteville Food Pantry at St. Paul Lutheran.

### **COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT**

- We now have a Little Free Pantry (aka blessing box) located by the entrance to Fellowship Hall. To learn more, please read the article found on page 10.
- The adult church school class provides a meal for NETwork Ministries once a month, typically on the 4th Thursday. They adjusted their schedule to continue this ministry in November and December. The next date will be January 29, 2026.
- The Heifer Project was successful again this year. Youth selected the animals to be purchased with the donations from November First Fruits. We give thanks for their leadership with this program, helping families around the world.
- Chambers BellFest bell choir concert was held on Sunday, December 14, at 7 pm.
   A new bell group from Messiah UMC in Shippensburg joined St. John's UCC, First Lutheran, and Park Avenue UMC for a wonderful holiday concert.
- Saturday, January will be our first (and hopefully annual) Winterfest Dance.
- Winter Warmth Drive with the United Way continues through January 16. More information can be found on page 9.

## Future Together Progress Report

#### FINANCIAL SUSTAINABILTY

- Council met with Mark Story of Habitat for Humanity at their December 17 to more formally explore using part of our property to develop Habitat houses. Additional information will be shared with the congregation as this possible collaboration develops. Stay tuned!
- Our HVAC loan rate will reset in July 2026. Contributions toward Mission Possible, our HVAC campaign, are greatly appreciated as we work to pay off this debt.
- The parking lot project has gone well up to this point. The trees and islands have been eliminated in parking lot A, the electrical work complete, and initial repaying of those areas finished. The major work will resume after Memorial Day.
- Jessica and Friends continues to grow and expand, providing services for adults in the community with autism and intellectual disability. They are renting increased space in our building and renewed their lease for 2026.
- Our building continues to be used for community art classes, both on Mondays
  and branching out into Saturdays as well. We give thanks for their partnership and
  ways that we can support creative endeavors.
- We received a \$10,000 grant from the Penn Central Conference's Innovation
  Grant with the help of Ghostwriter, LLC. We have switched to a project-based
  model to work with them, rather than a monthly retainer, in 2026. Grants have
  become more competitive over the last year and we want to be good stewards of
  the resources that the congregation has entrusted to us.
- Many thanks to everyone who uses online giving, EFTs, and other ways to support
  St. John's financially. We have a QR code to our online giving website on the back
  of every bulletin and as part of the Spirit. We also try to include a finance-related
  article each month in the newsletter.





### "Holy Manners for Our St. John's United Church of Christ Faith Community"

First introduced to SJUCC during a workshop on Healthy Congregations, the idea of a Behavioral Covenant has been part of our Future Together Strategic Plan since Fall 2023. Under the stewardship of Lloyd Beers and Connie Morrill-Hair, a draft of "Holy Manners for Our St. John's United Church of Christ Faith Community" (a Behavioral Covenant) has been developed. Pick up a copy of the draft "Holy Manners" or request one from the church office and plan to attend a congregational discussion and feedback session on Sunday, January 11, 2026 and/or Sunday, January 25, 2026, in Room 116 after worship. We hope to adopt this covenant at the Congregational Annual Meeting on Sunday, February 8. Questions can be directed to Lloyd Beers or Pastor Caroline.

### What is a behavioral covenant?

A behavioral covenant is a written compact between an organization and its members that serves as a formal, binding agreement regarding personal, interpersonal and organizational conduct. In other settings, similar agreements take the form of policy documents. Examples include; Code of Conduct, Code of Ethics, Workplace Behavior or Community Guidelines, Principles of Integrity, just to name a few. In organizational settings, these published behavioral expectations presume civil and professional behavior on the part of individuals and the organization.

### What is a behavioral covenant designed to do?

The St. John's UCC behavioral covenant entitled "Holy Manners for Our St. John's United Church of Christ Faith Community" is designed to promote a positive, caring environment by offering a framework for civil behavior and holy manners in all personal and group interactions. The covenant also serves as a reminder of our responsibilities where instances of disagreement arise. In a time in which divisions are increasing, we at St. John's UCC seek to come together in unity (not uniformity) as a church community, and walk and work with one another in love.

### How it will a behavioral covenant encourage us to be our best selves?

As a document grounded in scripture, "Holy Manners" calls us to reflect the teachings of Jesus and his disciples, and to commit to the greatest commandments. By agreeing to the ten items contained in the covenant, we, as a congregation, are called to love one another, unite as a family, welcome everyone, practice and promote truth, respect, and understanding in communication, and be personally responsible in avoiding conflict. Finally, we are called to act with peace and love for the wellbeing of the congregation. "Holy Manners for Our St. John's United Church of Christ Faith Community" is a solemn covenant that acknowledges our belief in God, our bond in Christ, the guidance of the Holy Spirit, and strength of our family united in faith.


## ADULT CHURCH SCHOOL: NEW CLASS BEGINNING IN JANUARY

## **Camp Ministry Report**


We have been working to freshen up our facility. We received a \$5000 grant from the UCC Outdoor Ministry. \$2200 of the grant was used for maintenance and improvements. Mike Blumberg painted the dining hall and kitchen floors. Tom Kinton and Ken Dilling patched cabin walls along with Dick Rebok. They also replaced and patched screen doors and windows. Renee Byers and Diana Kongkeattikul painted shower floors. Our water heater in the kitchen was replaced last spring.

We created a new camp rental plan and form. It is available online. Thanks to the congregation for our sponsor a camper funds. We were able to support more campers than usual using those funds and a few additional from our grand monies. Our bus transportation was paid for by the grant. That is usually our biggest expense for the camp season.

Currently we are working on programming for the next season. We have also applied for and received a new grant for 2025. This will bring us another dishwasher to replace that which the rodents killed last spring.

We plan for another sticky bun sale March 30th!


